Parenting and Visiting Program a Hit with Teen Fathers

Every child deserves to grow up in a safe and nurturing home. Social science research shows us that the presence of an involved, appropriate father plays a significant role in a child's school achievement, self-regulation and social competency. Growing to responsible adulthood is hard enough for any child; without a dad the hurdles are much higher.

Most students placed at Boys Republic come from such homes. They are, in fact, part of a multi-generational fatherless cycle. Without intervention, it's a downward spiral that goes like this: from early childhood abuse and neglect into the child welfare system, to juvenile delinquency and out-of-home placement, and eventually to the adult criminal system.

Boys Republic's programs in guidance and education are carefully crafted to reorient at-risk youth toward responsible adulthood. Just this last spring, the agency added a new tool to its offering.

Teen Parenting and Visiting Program

Nearly one in ten of the male teenagers at Boys Republic are already fathers or soon-to-be parents, themselves. From the confines of

New Teen Parenting Class Combines Classroom Learning with Hands-On Experience


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placement, juvenile dads have little opportunity to bond with their infants or to learn even the most basic skills of parenthood.

The Teen Parenting and Visiting Program (TPVP) is a voluntary, ten-week parenting education program specially designed for juvenile fathers. TPVP involves both classroom learning as well as hands-on experience.

As part of the TPVP, infants visit with their dads. The young fathers learn many practical skills — how to hold a baby, changing diapers and, in general, how to be appropriately attentive to an infant or toddler.

The class was an instant hit with teen fathers. One satisfied student wrote, "My son was born December 9 and I got busted January 24, so I really didn't get a lot of time with him so that really broke my heart . . . my biggest fear is to fail as a father. But . . . [TPVP] helped me overcome my fear and gave me the tools to be a good father."



Annual Award Ceremony Provides Recognition for Good Citizenship, Academic Accomplishment

A fall harvest of more than \$26,000 in scholarships and awards was reaped by students and recent graduates of Boys Republic and Girls Republic during the agency's Annual Awards ceremony, September 3.

Altogether, 27 students and graduates received financial recognition ranging from \$100 clothing allowances to \$2,500 scholarships for outstanding scholastic achievement and overall program success. Twelve others received certificates of scholarship eligibility.

Boys Republic's Annual Award Ceremony recognizes students for exemplary effort, accomplishment or citizenship. The awards are broadly focused in three areas: educational scholarships, vocational scholarships, and aftercare assistance awards (help with rent deposits, clothing, bus transportation, or tools necessary for a job). Over the course of the last year, Boys Republic distributed a total of \$35,178 in scholarship awards.

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A Christmas Story

As the year draws to a close, many wise investors look to their planned giving programs to help them put their taxable income and assets in order to reduce their tax burden while, at the same time, presenting a significant holiday gift to one or more non-profit charities of their choice.

One often-used planned giving vehicle for investors owning highly appreciated, long-term property — whether real property or personal — is the charitable remainder trust.

While few people would confuse the IRS with Santa Claus, the charitable remainder trust is a part of the tax code that can provide gifts to everyone - givers and recipients.

Under a charitable remainder trust, the appreciated real or personal property is put in trust to go to the designated charity upon the death of the donor(s). In the meantime, the donors can reap one or more tax advantages and, under the right circumstances, can realize increased interest income from the principle over what they were making before the gift.

Here's a Christmas Carol that illustrates how a charitable remainder trust can work. (The numbers are an estimated return and were chosen for illustration purposes only, as individual situations may vary.)

Bob Cratchitt, age 67, and Mrs. Cratchitt, age 65, have a quantity of highly appreciated stock in Scrooge, Inc. which they do not wish to sell because of the high income tax they would have to pay on the gain. They have owned the stock ever since Scrooge made Cratchitt a partner a number of years ago. At that time, they paid \$7,000 for 100 shares.

Today the stock is worth \$57,000. The Cratchitts are realizing a return of four percent on the stock or \$2,280 a year.

If the Cratchitts sold the stock, they would owe \$14,000 in federal income tax in their current bracket of 28 percent.

Fortunately, Marley's ghost has recommended a good investment counselor who has suggested making a gift of the stock to Boys Republic through a charitable remainder trust. In this way, the Cratchitts will pay no tax on the gain and, at their ages, will get a current income tax deduction of about \$13,000. In addition, they could realize about twice the return — an income of \$4,560 a year — over what they had been making on the stock. All that plus they make a significant gift to Boys Republic which the school will realize at the time of their deaths.

This year the Baldy View ROP Landscape Class at Boys Republic has learned and practiced landscape design, installation and maintenance beautifying our 200 acre campus as well as volunteer landscape work in the community.

The class has also found time to plant spring and summer gardens. Our spring garden produced enough 'veggies' to supply our campus kitchen, which feeds approximately 200 staff and students, with potatoes for potato salad, cases of tomatoes and even some melons for those hot summer days in the shade.

The real excitement though has been watching the

students plant and nurture about an acre of various types of pumpkins in what is becoming a traditional crop at Boys Republic.

ROP Landscape began at Boys Republic in Chino Hills in July 2008. The first order of business was to introduce the students to the miracle of growth by planting a small (50 ft. x 50 ft.) pumpkin patch.

Although only one or two students had ever planted a seed before, with professional guidance and mentoring from C&R and Peltzer Farms, all 20 or so students did well building mounds and planting tiny to mega-pumpkin seeds. Students learned the three basic soil types, how to compost and rototill, install a sprinkler & drip system, germination and thinning of sprouts, weeding, fertilization, herbicide and organic insect control.

After months of care and anxious anticipation the fruits of the students' labor

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paid off. The first pumpkin of the 2008 harvest was picked on September 3rd and given to our school principal. It weighed approximately 65 pounds and was a beautiful yellow/orange variegated pumpkin. By the end of the season we had a half dozen pumpkins near 100 pounds with another 50 pumpkins fist size to 20 pounders ranging from white to pink to varying shades of orange.

Each of those first summer semester students selected a pumpkin to take home or share with their student cottage. The remainder of the pumpkins was auctioned to staff and friends of our pumpkin patch to partially pay for materials and an ROP harvest party. This year we intend to sell our specialty pumpkins at the Chino Hills Farmers Market.

Pumpkins are one of the few crops that actually grow quicker than most weeds. Once pumpkins begin to bloom and set fruit, the students like to inspect them, almost on a daily basis, to see how much a pumpkin has grown. With a variety of pumpkins, students wander the pumpkin patch 'oogling' at the Tiny Tim pumpkins, the dark green and grey varieties, the white Casper, Fairytale and Cinderella pumpkins and of course the 100+ pound jumbo pumpkins that literally grow in size each day.

As these students, many who are "city boys," wander the patch they are introduced to big bumble bees fluttering flower to flower, Preying Mantises, Lady Bugs as well as bad insects, pests and of course weeding which all makes for a great outdoor learning as well as life experience.
