beginning to think about Christmas, students at Boys Republic are nearing the final stages of a year-long preparation for their 89th annual holiday wreath campaign

It starts in January. Weekend work parties of boys and staff go into fields, forests and orchards to collect numerous varieties of seed pods, nuts, cones and other natural, dried materials. Then during the week, each sackful is sorted, cleaned, drilled and wired. The cones and pods are then wired together into decorative arrays and stored in boxes and bins in an old gymnasium transformed into a wreath barn on the agency's Chino Hills campus. Because of the fresh materials they contain, the final hand-assembly, packaging and shipment of the finished wreaths is limited to a period of only a few weeks at the start of the holiday season. Yet each Della Robbia wreath represents a full year of effort by Boys Republic students and the professional wreath staff that works with them.

The annual Della Robbia wreath project is first and foremost a work experience program. Troubled teens learn, perhaps for the first time in their lives, to show up for

work on-time, to attend to the task at-hand, to cooperate with co-workers, and take direction from a supervisor — all good work habits that prepare teens for the world of responsible and productive adulthood.

Sugar Ray Leonard is Honorary Chairman of the 2012 National Campaign

The Della Robbia wreath program is one of the oldest and largest self-help enterprises undertaken by any child-care agency in the nation. Its accomplishments would never have been possible, however, without the help of an involved community of supporters. This year, media personality and former champion boxer Sugar Ray Leonard is the latest in a long line of prominent Americans who for more than 50 years have added luster and prestige to the annual fund-raising effort. In agreeing to fulfill the role of Honorary National Della Robbia Wreath Campaign Chairman, Mr. Leonard has appeared in literature and advertising promoting the wreath sale.

Enormously popular around the world, Sugar Ray Leonard's sincere, charismatic personality coupled with his ring experience as a world champion — he won world titles in five different weight categories — has led to success in television as a boxing analyst. Last November, Mr. Leonard gave a stirring talk to Boys Republic students encouraging them to make good decisions.

BOTTLE TREE POD

Anatomy of a Della Robbia®

PINE CONES

Cones from a variety of pine and fir trees are used in every wreath, some gathered at altitudes of up to 10,000 feet in the Sierra Nevada Mountains.

COTTON BURR

These delicate star-shaped pods are gleaned from the fields of the San Joaquin Valley after the cotton crop has been picked.

EVERGREEN BOUGHS

Supple noble fir evergreens are harvested fresh in the forests Northern California and Oregon. No trees are harmed in the pruning process.

LIQUIDAMBAR

A member of the witch hazel family, liquidambar trees grow in great profusion throughout Southern California. These spiny seed casings are gathered early in the year.

PLUMOSUM

Named for their feather-like plumes, these novel cones are native to Israel and South Africa

WINESAP APPLES & FRESH LEMONS

Hand-rubbed in alcohol and then lacquered to keep them colorful and plump.

> Note: The number, selection and placement of cones and seedpods upon the Della Robbia Wreath may vary each year, depending upon the availability of these natural materials.

LOTUS POD

This pod is from a tree native to Australia and now grows in San This distinctive water lily seed Fernando Valley, California. casing with many of the seeds still

Students Earn Recognition at 2012 Annual Awards Ceremony

Boys Republic held its 105th Annual Awards Ceremony on September 13. Nearly 300 of the agency's teens and staff, local officials and proud parents gathered to honor selected students. Financial recognition at the awards ceremony ranged from \$100 to \$2,500 scholarships for outstanding scholastic or leadership achievement or overall program success.

Unlike traditional schools which offer educational scholarships, almost exclusively, Boys Republic presents awards that can be utilized in a variety of ways to help deserving students meet immediate or longer-term personal goals. Scholarship funds may be used to help further a student's education, but just as often, it may become a deposit on an apartment for a graduate with no family to return to, or it can buy food, tools, training or appropriate clothing to help a graduate qualify for a job.
